




Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper & Talent Show

"Storming Heaven's Gate" is an anthology of spiritual writings by women. It has been added to the


Spirituality section.

Everyday Callings: Called to the Way of Love at Life House



I've always felt called to work with young people, but never did I say to myself, "I want to work with homeless and at-risk youth." When I look back now I can see how circumstances and events led me to my work today. I can see our creator's hand in it.

Two of my favorite quotes, which also really exemplify how I feel about my work at Life House, are by Father Gregory Boyle, a Jesuit Priest and founder of Homeboy Industries, one of the best gang intervention programs in the United States.

In his book Tattoos on the Heart he states, "Kinship (is) not serving the other, but being one with the other. Jesus was not a 'man for others'; he was one with them. There is a world of difference in that." He also states, "You stand with the least likely to succeed un-

til success is succeeded by something more valuable: kinship. You stand with the belligerent, the surly, and the badly behaved until bad behavior is recognized for the language it is: the vocabulary of the deeply wounded and of those whose burdens are more than they can bear."

I would say that this type of kinship is one of Life House's biggest strengths, and this kinship with the youth we serve is a significant element in all of our programming: Housing, Wellness, Youth Center, Employment, and Education (my program). People ask me what I do, and I usually tell them that I help first generation youth with the college enrollment process, tutor youth studying for their GEDs, help youth reconnect with high school, connect young parents to ECFE/Preschool/Child Care resources, among other duties. But honesty, the most important thing I do, and that I feel called to do, is simply to love my youth for who they are in each moment, no matter what is going on or what decisions they may have made, recognizing that people are complicated and this world is complicated. Often what people need is for someone to be there with them, not just there for them. From a personal faith perspective, I try to infuse a simple concept into my work, and that is to love unconditionally and to also be kind, compassionate, humble, gentle and patient (Colossians 3:12). Buddha also reiterated this, saying, "Teach this triple truth to all: A generous heart, kind speech, and a life of service and compassion are things which renew humanity."

People sometimes say to me, "Those youth are lucky to have you." This is very kind and very much appreciated, but it also leaves me feeling kind of sheepish. I truly feel honored to be a part of their lives, and honored that they would share their lives with me and be in kinship with me. I mean, look at me! I am a not-very-cool 40-year-old mom that basically drives a minivan, and to top it off I grew up in in the woods with few neighbors and my hippie parents. I'm also straight and quite white. On the surface we don't have a lot in common. Luckily, compassion and kindness and "being with" are way more powerful than trivial surface level ways to categorize humans, such as age, gender or race.

It is an honor to share in my youths' triumphs, joys, and vulnerabilities. It is an honor to advocate for them. Not to say there are not terribly difficult days, but I feel blessed beyond measure that my work at Life House feels more like a calling than a job.

Church Nights in February

Wednesday Church Nights have some exciting offerings this month. Church Nights have become the centerpiece of our Christian Formation program and include something for everyone. The adult programs for Church Night will focus on health, wellness and safety this month.

Our 5:30 pm Eucharist is held in church. This is a great way to attend service if you are not able to make it on Sunday (or even if you are able!). We gather in the front pews. Tom Hamilton leads our music on the piano. This service is less formal and shorter than Sunday. We use the scripture readings for the coming Sunday.

Buffy Helstrom (and friends) prepare our simple suppers that begin at 6:00 pm. Buffy does a wonderful job preparing a simple, healthy meal that we ask you to help support by making a donation toward defraying the cost.

Church Nights meet three times per month with programming from 6:30-7:30 pm. Two Wednesdays, the children and youth have age-specific faith formation for grades pre-K through Confirmation. Faith formation is life-long, so adults have the opportunity to engage in programs, speakers and discussions on various topics. Please let me know if you have suggestions for speakers or programs.

One Wednesday we will be together for GIFT; Growing in Faith Together, which gives a chance for all ages to **engage** in fun faith activities together. We will have one Wednesday where we don't gather at church, instead that time can be used for focusing on faith at home. On the months where there are five Wednesdays, our church leaves the building and engages in a service project somewhere in our community.

February Church Night Adult Programs:

February 5 – Liza Anderson will present "A Short History of Sin:" The struggle against sin and temptation is a central part of the Christian life, but it has never been understood in a static or monolithic way. Christians in different historical periods have emphasized different sins (and different virtues), and even common lists like the "7 deadly sins" changed form in different eras, depending upon what were seen as the most pressing Christian moral concerns in each time. This presentation looks at the different ways in which sin

was understood in different eras of church history, with an eye towards broadening the ways in which we think about sin and temptation in the 21st century.

Liza is a historical theologian, who received her MDiv. from Harvard Divinity School and her PhD from Yale University. She has been a member of St. Paul's since moving to Duluth in August to begin a position as Assistant Professor of Theology at the College of St. Scholastica. She is also active as a lay leader within the wider Episcopal Church, including service on the Executive Council, the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music, and the General Board of Examining Chaplains.

February 12 – Ali Randall (NE MN Crisis Text Line Regional Coordinator for Carlton Co.) will present QPR (Question, Persuade, and Refer) Gatekeeper Training for Suicide Prevention. This is an educational program designed to teach lay and professional "gatekeepers" the warning signs of a suicide crisis and how to respond. Gatekeepers can include anyone who is strategically positioned to recognize and refer someone at risk of suicide. The process follows three steps: (1) Question the individual's desire or intent regarding suicide, (2) Persuade the person to seek and accept help, and (3) Refer the person to appropriate resources. Trainees receive a QPR booklet and wallet card as a review and resource tool that includes local referral resources such as Crisis Text Line.

February 19 – Church Night is **OFF** for Winter Break.

<u>February 26</u> – Ash Wednesday. Services including communion and the imposition of ashes are at **noon** and **5:30 pm**. No regular Church Night programming.

Creation Care

There are two creation stories in the Book of Genesis (chapters 1 and 2). The first story takes place "in the beginning." God is a voice that brings the created world into existence with the words "let there be"... light, sky, earth, plants, sun, moon, fish, birds, cattle, creeping things and human beings. God blesses creation and calls it "good." God creates humankind "in our own image, according to our likeness" (1:26). We are created in the image and likeness of God and given the created world as a gift.

In the second creation story (Genesis 2: 4b-25). God plants a garden in Eden. God first "form(s) man from the dust of the ground breath(es) into his nostrils the breath of life." God then makes the waters flow and the trees grow. Not wanting the man to be alone God makes animals of every kind and brings them to the man to have him name them "but... there was not found a helper for the man." So God puts the man to sleep and encloses one of his ribs with flesh, and he finds a helper and partner.



In both of these stories, it is clear that the hand and voice of God brought creation and humankind into existence. These are not scientific accounts. They are not attempting to answer the *how* of creation but rather the *why*. They make it clear that the created world, "this fragile earth, our island home" (Eucharistic Prayer C) is God's **gift** to us. God carefully, lovingly planted a garden for our use. God entrusted it to us. Sadly, instead of treating it with care and respect, we have often chosen to neglect and abuse it.

Pope Francis points out that we have a moral responsibility to be good stewards of God's creation:

"The earth was here before us (and entrusted to us as a gift). What kind of world do we want to leave for those who come after us, to the children who are now growing up? Human beings, while capable of the worst, are also capable of rising above (ourselves)." Climate change is a message that something is wrong. You and I can choose "good," we can choose a more worthy and moral path. Opting for safe and clean energy solution such as wind and solar is evidence of the best in human beings and is an example of how we can act in the image of our Creator to preserve what (God) has bestowed. (Laudato Si)

There are two distinct creation stories in the Book of Genesis. Today, we are writing another creation story. It is a story of a climate out of balance, the degradation of God's creation, people and creatures of all kinds being harmed. We need to take action now to write a different story.

I am grateful for our newly reinvigorated Creation Care Team (formerly the Green Team). We are blessed to have people with passion and expertise. You can contact Charlie Orsak for more information or if you are interested.
