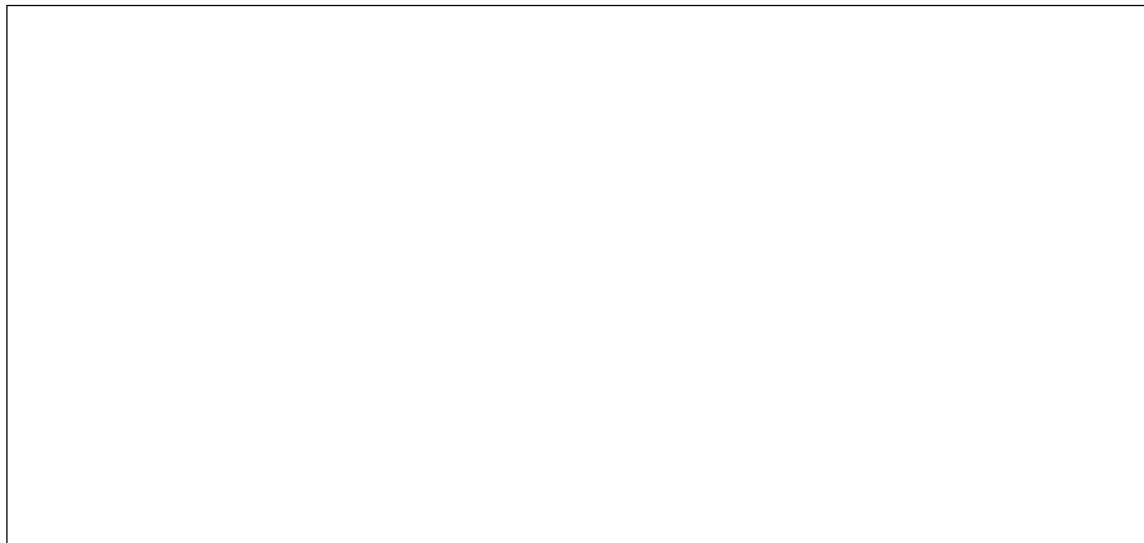
Damiano Soup Kitchen

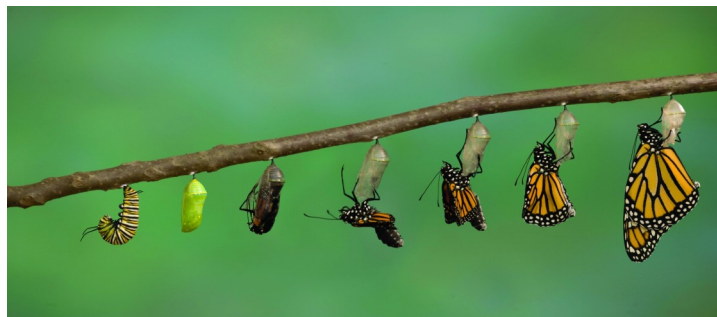

Church Nights in January

Wednesday Church Nights have some exciting offerings this month. Church Nights have become the centerpiece of our Christian Formation program and include something for everyone. The adult programs for Church Night will focus on health, wellness and safety this month.

Our 5:30 pm Eucharist is held in church. This is a great way to attend service if you are not able to make it on Sunday (or even if you are able!). We gather in the front pews. Tom Hamilton leads our music on the piano. This service is less formal and shorter than Sunday. We use the scripture readings for the coming Sunday.

Buffy Helstrom (and friends) prepare our simple suppers that begin at 6:00 pm. Buffy does a wonderful job preparing a simple, healthy meal that we ask you to help support by making a donation toward defraying the cost.

Church Nights meet three times per month with programming from 6:30-7:30 pm. Two Wednesdays, the children and youth have age-specific faith formation for grades pre-K through Confirmation. Faith formation is life-long, so adults have the opportunity to engage in programs, speakers and discussions on various topics. Please let me know if you have suggestions for speakers or programs.

One Wednesday we will be together for GIFT; Growing in Faith Together, which gives a chance for all ages to **engage** in fun faith activities together. We will have one Wednesday where we don't gather at church, instead that time can be used for focusing on faith at home. Creation Care Team: an Energizing Environment and Incubator of Ideas

St. Paul's newly formed Creation Care Team is up and running, aiming to fulfill our Christian responsibility to care for our planet and all its inhabitants, current and future. Although this is a "new" team, as noted in last month's Messenger we are building on the accomplishments of past efforts like the Green Church group, many of which help both environmentally AND financially.

We have found working with this team to be a really energizing experience. Learning and thinking about climate change can be downright frightening. Focusing on action rather than fear is uplifting.

What have we been up to? At the November 16 "Be the Spark" training, the staff from Minnesota Interfaith Power and Light (mnipl.org) led us through a variety of thought-provoking exercises intended to develop climate justice leadership grounded in respectful conversations. It was great to hear the different experiences and perspectives shared by participants from several different congregations.

We are well on our way to becoming an official MNIPL Climate Justice Congregation - the first in the region. MNIPL describes this as "faith communities who are committed to living out their faith through effective and sustained action on Climate Justice."

The next step will be to organize the wide variety of "hey! what if we?" Ideas that arose out of our brainstorming to create a menu of prioritized action items and topics we can work on as individuals or small groups. Watch for ways that you can get involved at church or in your own home/work/school. One guiding principal you will see embodied in a number of the actions – something that St. Paul's youth learn in Faith Formation - is the SEVEN R's. We used to talk about "the THREE R's" of waste management as Reduce, Re-use, Recycle. The seven R's start with RETHINK. This one word perfectly captures what each of us need to do in all aspects of our life if we want to see change. Next time you are planning a vacation, hosting a big dinner, creating a holiday gift list – anything – take a minute to RETHINK. Is there a way you could do that activity differently in ways that **use less energy** or **less new materials** and **create less waste**? I hope you will take on this challenge and share what you discover with the Creation Care Team.

Library Notes

Some recent additions to the library:

In the audio/visual area, the library received a 35-CD set containing the lectures of Thomas Merton. Some of the titles include: Finding True Meaning and Beauty; 12 Degrees of Humility; Prayer and Growth in Christian Life, Monastic Spirituality; Ways of Prayer; Medieval Monastic Movements.

I had the chance to visit the Washington National Cathedral a few years ago when I was visiting Washington D.C. It is inspiring. The library has received a book by Frederick Quinn called “A House of Prayer for All People.” It is a history of the Washington National Cathedral told through pictures and the lives of the men and women who first envisioned and then built it. This is found in the Episcopal History area of the library.

The library has received several parenting books. A few of them are:

Breen, Galit, “Kindness Wins.” A simple, no-nonsense guide to teaching kids how to be kind online. Covers ten habits to teach kids as they’re learning to post, tweet and share online.

Good, Phyllis and Merle, “Ideas for Families.” This is a collection of lists of specific practices and tradi-

tions for routine days, moments of celebration and troublesome matters. It is a compilation of ideas from other parents. The goal here is “thoughtful living.”

Melheim, Richard, Dr., “Holding Your Family Together.” Five simple steps to help bring your family closer to God and each other. The author advocates a nightly routine with the entire family. The five steps are: share your highs and lows of the day; read a key Bible verse; talk about how the Bible verse reading might relate to your day; pray for one another aloud, bless one another. There is a list of one year’s worth of Bible verses at the end of the book. The verses are short, usually only one or two sentences.
