

Phases of Re-Gathering

On Thursday, May 14, we received directives from our bishop on the anticipated phases of regathering for churches. At this time, we are in Phase 1.5 (of 5). You can find the whole plan at: https://episcopalmn.org/covid19-response

Here's a summary of our current phase 1.5:

- Groups of 10 or fewer individuals may return to faith community buildings to film or live-stream services, as long as appropriate physical distancing is maintained.
- Weddings and funerals that cannot be postponed may take place outdoors, as long as they are gatherings of 10 people or less and follow the physical distancing and the wearing of masks.
- Those who are sick, those who have underlying health conditions, and those who are over the age of 65 should not re-gather in any form or fashion during this phase.
- All other groups and gatherings continue to be suspended until further notice.
- It is very likely that we will remain in this phase for quite some time.
- ECMN summer camping programs will be exclusively on-line.

This means very little will change at St. Paul's. We will continue to record the Sunday service and other offerings. Staff will work from home as much as possible. Meetings will be held on-line.

Our bishop went on to say this:

"While this season comes with great difficulty, it also comes with great opportunity to consider what the Holy Spirit is teaching us about how we sustain a life of common prayer, how we care for one another, and how we bear witness to the gospel in the world."

As church, we need to be mindful that we are called to have a Christian response to this pandemic. This means that we are always mindful of the common good, considering what is best not only for ourselves,

but for others. As I watched our neighbors to the east filling taverns and lifting a glass to cheer with unmasked faces when Wisconsin opened up, I was thinking that we must remember that our personal freedom is always subject to, and constrained by, the common good. We must always be mindful of the welfare of others.

You cannot shout "fire" in a crowded movie theater (even though we have freedom of speech). You cannot drive any speed you want (even though you might feel you are able to do so safely). You are required to have you children immunized and to pay taxes. Young women and men can be compelled to serve in the military. Our personal freedom has limits...

As the church, as Christians, we need to be setting an example for the rest of the world to follow when it comes to this pandemic and following practices that keep our neighbors safe. As folks have said over and over: staying home is loving our neighbor.

Our bishop concluded his message with this thought:

"What is being is asked of all of us is hard, and this is a long journey. We take heart knowing we walk this road together, and in this season of Easter, that we are always held by a God whose loving embrace cannot be broken by the powers of darkness and death that so often surround us. Let us not forget that in good times and bad times, in joy and in sorrow, in life and in death, we make our song: Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia."

If you are recording using a phone, please hold it 'landscape.' By uploading a video, you are authorizing ECMN to post it, together with other submitted videos, online on the consecration livestream.

The Consecration and Ordination service would normally have featured a beautiful and diverse set of musical offerings from across ECMN. Because we can't gather in person, we're asking you to send us recordings of music from your faith community or ECMN affiliate organization that you'd like to share with the bishop-elect and with all of ECMN. We will take bits and pieces of these offerings and weave them together in a video that will be shared in the livestream of the consecration service during the postlude.

Our governor has designated the 19th as a monthly day to fly all flags at half mast in memory of those who died in this pandemic.

Today is sunny and breezy. The fire danger is acute. We need rain.

An ore boat is headed into the choppy waves. Lake lev-

els are extremely high and shore erosion continues along the Scenic 61 where the Grandmas' Marathon usually runs. There are now several acute cliffs biting into the pavement and bike trail. This spring season has usual and unusual portents ahead.

Human cultures seem to organize life around themes and events commemorating time passing. The lunar movements are often natural markers.

Islam's Ramadan ends with the close of this phase. Next year the whole cycle advances by one phase. For Christian and Jewish folk Passover and Easter depend on Full moon and Equinox phases. For Ojibway people the moons are named on the natural events of plants and animals. We are about to enter into the Strawberry moon, followed by the Raspberry and Blueberry moons.

The Episcopal Church in Minnesota is about to enter a new season with a new bishop. We have rituals of hopes and dreams, for us, and for him and his family. We will all face both usual and unusual times. May we trust our Creator and stay hopeful and faithful.

We can still take time on June 15, 2020 to look back at June 15, 1920. On that day Elias, Elmer and Isaac were falsely accused and jailed. A mob of Duluthians broke into the jail and lynched the three young men.

From Your Vestry

Greetings from your safe-at-home wardens and vestry! This past week we held our monthly vestry meeting via Zoom again. We continue to note concerns about being under budget for income without the weekly plate collections, but our online (and now text!) giving has seen the highest ever totals in March and April of this year, since we began that option. We approved a service contract with Buffy Helstrom to provide weekly cleaning and sanitizing of the building spaces being used by staff, as COVID-19 gathering restrictions have not changed our protocols yet for building access. Natalie's application for the payroll assistance was approved, and fortunately will help us cover payroll expenses for the next several months; this was a virtual lifesaver!

St. Paul's online offerings have continued to reach large audiences, and a work group is beginning to research the technology we would need to transition to livestreaming services and events (as opposed to the video recording we are currently doing). As it becomes increasingly apparent that our physical gathering will continue to be limited, not just in the immediate future but also considering how to minimize risks for our vulnerable members, we recognize that our online presence will be an ever more significant element in how we engage with each other and reach out beyond the walls of St. Paul's church building.

Yet the building must still be cared for. The vestry spent considerable time listening to Craig Fellman's presentation on the bids received for the tuckpointing project, and asking probing questions about the costs, need and timing for this expen-



sive but critical maintenance and long-term protection project. Craig has worked diligently with our architectural consultant and several parish members with specific expertise, to define the most critical aspects and incorporate substantial 'value engineering' (i.e., safely reducing construction costs) so that we can best evaluate the factors for reaching a decision. Given the immensity of this decision, both for the physical integrity of the church and the financial resiliency of our parish, we want to hear your questions and concerns directly. We will do our best to provide all relevant information and responses. We welcome your perspectives on the best course of action. The vestry is planning a special meeting on June 2 solely to continue discussions about this proposed project.



From Your Creation Care Team

The Seven Rs

For many decades we were taught to reduce, reuse, recycle... all good ways to protect our environment, but limited in their scope. Now many have expanded those 3 to include 7 R's that we can all strive to engage in to save our earth. Here's a quick look at each of them:

Rethink: Before we purchase anything online or in the store, stop and think... is this a need or a want? Do I really need individually wrapped snacks? Could I make this from materials I already have? Could I borrow this item?

Refuse: refuse single-use plastics (straws, bags, etc.)

Reduce: instead of thinking, "well I can recycle this" how about reducing the frequency or amount of items that need to be recycled? Remember just because a plastic item has a number in a triangle on it, does not mean that it can be recycled. That just denotes what type of plastic it is.

Repurpose: whether it's glass jars from pasta sauce, clothing items we can turn into bags, rags or quilts, or items we no longer want but could sell or donate, try to repurpose items.

Reuse: minimize single use items and instead purchase ones that can be reused or recharged, e.g. batteries, cloth napkins, cloth kitchen towels, etc.

Recycle: make sure you are recycling everything you possibly can.

Rot: allow your organic waste to decompose and be transformed over time into nutrient rich soil amendment. If you don't have the option of composting where you live, you can drop it off at several spots; like Marshall Hardware, At Sara's Table and WLSSD.



Also, the recent CARES Act includes new charitable giving provisions for 2020, for cash gifts only to the church:

- Individuals can take a \$300 "above-the-line" deduction from their gross income even if they do not itemize deductions; and
- Donors who itemize charitable deductions may deduct charitable gifts up to 100% of gross income.

From Your Music Director



Sisters and brothers in Christ,

We are living in strange times. For obvious reasons, the church feels so much more empty than usual, and I am profoundly sad about that.

The reports that singing is a dangerous activity in the midst of the pandemic have sent shock

waves through my friends and colleagues. I have thought of little else since this was announced, and I can't wrap my head around worship without song. Make no mistake, we at St. Paul's take these experts very seriously, so it isn't that I'm thinking of defying orders. I just don't know how to think about being together in community and having the song of the people silenced. Luther said the only human response to God's goodness to us in Jesus is to sing. When we are finally able to be together again, we will have to find other ways to voice our praise, prayer, and lament. Part of that lament will be that our voices have been silenced by this insidious virus.

In the mean time, I encourage you to sing at home. Sing out with full voice and without caring how it sounds. If you are fortunate to have someone in your house with you, they love you and don't care how it sounds. I only have the cats, and

they would find fault if Pavarotti himself walked through our door and started singing. As I have said to you many times, everyone sings. The issue is *not* whether you sing well or in tune or anything like that. God hears the beauty in all voices.

Jay Austin and I continue to work on some sort of virtual singing experience. I have been down a few rabbit holes around this issue, but it will happen.. I would like as many as are able to participate. Keep your eye on the newsletter and the weekly emails for more information on this. We are already working with some bell choir members to put together a virtual bell piece.

So, for now, we wait for news. It is kind of a combination of Advent waiting with eager anticipation and Lenten self-denial of many things. Once again, I can't tell you how much I miss you all. I'm thankful for my own health as well as the health of my children. I am so thankful for you, the community at St. Paul's. I did an arrangement of a spiritual that the choir has sung a couple of times in church. In this time of when we are apart from each other and unable to sing together, I commend to you the text: Over my head, I hear music in the air; there must be a God somewhere.
